




PRACTICE REFLECTION TOOLS

Applying a Protective and Promotive Factors Approach through Core Functions of Practice

This packet includes a set of Practice Reflection Tools for child welfare and other human services workers to reflect on how consistently they are taking specific actions that can help families and youth to build protective and promotive factors through each of seven core functions of practice.

Workers can use these tools, in the context of supervision or on their own, to identify ways in which they are consistently taking a strengths-based, protective and promotive factors approach, and areas where they may want to focus on improving their practice.
